Setting: An upscale hotel suite. There is a couch, a coffee table, and side chair.

At Rise: An open suitcase is on the sofa. Some clothes are spread around it, and shoes are on the floor. Half- eaten snacks and diet cokes are on the coffee table. PEARL enters brushing her teeth. (SOUND CUE: A knock on the door)

PEARL: Be right there!

BENNY: (O.S.) I got time. No rush.

PEARL: (She looks in a mirror and adjusts her make-up and hair) OK. Just a minute. (She rushes around. Picking things up and getting rid of the toothbrush, she finally opens the door.)

BENNY: Hey, Pearl!

BENNY: Yeah. It's been a while. (*shrugs*) Sorry. There were so many people at Mom's funeral. I had trouble focusing. You know.

PEARL: Oh, yeah. Sure. (staring at him) I thought your eyes were blue.

BENNY: Nope. Brown. Always brown. Though in some folks call them hazel. (*looking past her*) Nice room. From what I can see out here.

PEARL: Oh! Come in. Please. (She opens the door wider. He enters with a large suitcase and a fish bowl that holds two goldfish. Sorry. It's just so good to see you again. Too bad it had to be under these circumstances.

BENNY: It was inevitable. At least Mom's not suffering anymore.

PEARL: Doesn't make it any easier.

BENNY: No. It doesn't. You only got one mom.

PEARL: Yeah. I'm embarrassed the place is such a mess. I was expecting you a little later.

BENNY: There wasn't any traffic. Don't worry. No problem. I'm not in a rush. Hardly ever am anymore now that I'm retired. Companies call it that now. Early retirement. That way they don't count us in the unemployment numbers and give the politicians a bad bump up. Bastards!

PEARL: Boy! You got your hands full there. Let me help you.

BENNY: Thanks.

(Pearl takes the goldfish bowl and places it on the coffee table. Benny sits on the chair and puts the suitcase in front of him.)
