CAST

WAITRESS: A young woman.

DEE: An attractive woman in her late forties. She wears a simple dress and modest jewelry.

BRADLEY: A man wearing a tailored suit.

<u>Place</u> A restaurant.

<u>Time</u> The present. Midafternoon.

Setting: The outdoor patio area of the restaurant. A table at Center is set for six.

At Rise: Lights come up on PENNY and CARLA who enter and sit down at the table for six. The WAITRESS approaches.

WAITRESS: May I suggest a smaller more comfortable table for two?

PENNY: We're expecting others.

WAITRESS: I can take your drink orders while you're waiting.

CARLA: I'll have a diet coke.

PENNY: Vodka martini. Make it a double and no ice. I don't want it diluted. Fill it to the very brim in the largest glass you can find.

WAITRESS: Would you like to look at the menu?

CARLA: I really shouldn't. I just had lunch. I'll just sneak a peek at your dessert menu.

PENNY: Food between my morning coffee and dinner interferes with my martini schedule.

(The Waitress leaves)

CARLA: Bradley always said you were a world-class drinker.

PENNY: I never even smelled alcohol until I met him. Three years of marriage changed that. After we split, it took me seven years and two more husbands to cut down to four double martinis a day.
