JOANNA: Cynic, recently divorced. Arrives late. Wearing cowgirl boots from the 1960s in mint condition.

CECELIA: Former beauty queen, married and divorced well. Dressed tastefully to show off her legs and other attributes.

MARTHA: Radical journalist. Casual dress, flat shoes.

THE CHEERLEADERS: CINDY, SANDY, and CANDY. They act as instigators. Wearing mismatched cheerleading uniforms but with the same school colors.

ACT ONE

Prologue

Setting: Cyberspace. As an echo of the past, we hear a high school choir singing the school song.

SONG: Anthem

Hail to our dear old High
Where hearts beat strong and true
We have a will to win, a way to learn
In all we say and do
We hold our banner high
Beneath the Colorado sky
Oh hail to thee, sweet home of mine
And hail to our dear old High

At Rise: The CHEERLEADERS come forward to address the audience. GAIA is sitting center stage with an open laptop. Other CAST members can either be onstage or enter when they first sing.

CINDY: It all started when Lindy--I mean Gaia--contacted us through cyberspace for a 47th high school reunion. It sounded crazy--all about numbers and planets. SANDY: But even though she's gone all New-Age-y and changed her name to Gaia, she's still one of us.

CANDY: So we wanted to support her. We wanted to cheer her on.

(They join GAIA, and line up behind her with arms extended in different attitudes, as if together they are a multi-armed Indian goddess. GAIA's hands are preparing to write an email)

SONG: The Great 47th

GAIA: (taps on keyboard) *Greetings*, *Earthlings*.

CANDY: Maybe something a little more—personal?

GAIA: (types) Hello, Classmates.

SANDY: That's better.

GAIA: (continues typing through the song)
Planets have begun
To dance across the sky
In synchronization
And all the numbers are beginning to align
A most auspicious sign

CHEERLEADERS: Awww-spicious!

GAIA: Hello Classmates, through the ether Message from the stars Telling us to reconverge And mingle our memoirs Urging us to merge our chi And send it into space A most expansive place

CHEERLEADERS: Exxxx-pansive!

GAIA: Make your plans now - be sure to arrive

This year the class of '65 is 65!

CHEERLEADERS: Those of us lucky enough to be alive!

GAIA: It has the value

of the year that we were born:

CHEERLEADERS: Three!

GAIA: And that is why you have to listen to me— We must reconvene, you must make the scene

GAIA/CHEERLEADERS: On August 11th, for the Great 47th Reunion!

MARTHA: (replying by electronic device, as they all do)

But fifty's the usual number we use

To get together to talk & drink booze

Retelling all the tales of oh so long ago

Each of us remembering a different scenario

However...

If you that this is the right way to go

I guess I might come just to witness the show

CHARLIE: I find your numerology rather spurious

Still I admit I am a bit curious

To see my friends

From so long ago

Before it's over

Before death--and you know

We're getting much closer

To apocalypse now

So if you're asking me to come

I'll get there somehow

EDDIE: Will Joanna be there? Will Joanna be there?

JOANNA: I've not decided if I'll be so bold to dare I just got divorced and they will all think I'm there to find another guy--in truth I'd rather die

plus I know that Eddie will be hovering nearby All of these years he's been waiting for me It's flattering but it makes me feel...creepy

EDDIE: Will Joanna be there? Will Joanna be there?

BEN/BILLY: Hey all, I'm coming Just to see who's around Check out what's happening In the old home town I'd like to see who'd like to see me Take part in all of the festivities

CECELIA: I look really good In fact I look great So yes, I will attend--And I don't have a date--

Right now. Just so you know.

CHEERLEADERS: Oh Gaia

We'll stand by ya
Forty-seven
Sounds like heaven
We are your gals
Your cheerleading pals
Candy! Sandy! Cindy!
And we knew you as Lindy...Gaia...

GAIA: Hello Classmates, heed my email Note the date and time We will come together It will be sublime The class of '65 will meet again en masse A most illustrious class I know you all care Be there or be square

CAST: On August 11th for the Great 47th Reunion!

EDDIE: Will Joanna be there?

CANDY: And don't forget to send in your bio! Martha's first.

MARTHA: For the past 20 years I've been editor of an alternative newspaper called Vox Pop, and before that I was in a band called Violet Ray. Two daughters, grown up and moved away, thank god. Oops, did I say that? I enjoyed being a mom, really. It was marriage I couldn't handle--two divorces. Oh, and I play the accordion.

CINDY: Thank you. (checking her off) Billy.

BILLY: Okay, here's how it went: right out of high school, I attended the School of Mines, engineering, then transferred to Stanford, computers, then University of Hawaii, botany. Founded a company at age 28, making lotions and creams with ethno-botanicals. Big hit. And after I started making money, strangely enough I stopped being a dweeb.
