CAST

CAROL: I think it would be fun if we cleaned the house together. What do you think?

QUENTIN: Fun?

CAROL: Yes.

(silence)

CAROL: Well?

QUENTIN: Well, what?

CAROL: Shall we? Shall we clean the house together?

QUENTIN: Okay.

CAROL: When?

QUENTIN: Next year some time.

CAROL: I was thinking today would be a good time.

QUENTIN: Yes, I was too. I was thinking that today would be a good day to play golf.
