GRACE: Impossibly cheerful and annoyingly youthful, she wants to be in love but doesn't yet know what love is.

ONE MORE TOMORROW Scene 1

Setting: *The dock leading to 'The Miss Mossy', a venerable century-old riverboat.* At Rise: *JOHN stands on the dock and bellows the final boarding call.*

JOHN: All aboard! The Miss Mossy sets sail for its final river voyage in ten minutes. Cast off in ten minutes!

(Frenetic music. The cast hurries up on stage, juggling bags and talking. As they board, JOHN greets them with GRACE, the ship's cheerful young Purser. Ad libbing chatter, the characters hang their bags comically on their hosts' shoulders, arms and necks. As others head to the bar, RUDY and PAT take Center. He is thoughtful. She is a bit manic.)

RUDY:

(Song: The River of Life) Something is happening. Happening. Something new is happening. Something new is happening to me.

PAT: Of course something is happening, Rudy. We're taking a riverboat trip down the Mississippi. This is the trip you've always wanted. The trip *we've* always wanted.

RUDY: I know.

PAT: Something is happening. Happening. Something new is happening. Something new is happening.

RUDY: Something new is happening. Happening to me. Something good is happening. Something I can't see. And my head is ringing RUDY: (con't) With voices singing. I can't make out what they say.

PAT: Let's go get settled. We're in First Class you know!

RUDY: First Class? Can we afford that?

PAT: Don't worry. The kids chipped in.

RUDY: The kids? Wow. Something new IS happening!

PAT: There's a first time for everything!

(They move along; JOHN shooing everyone in. JIM, DORIS, and FLO take Center and sing.)

FLO: Everywhere it's happening, Everywhere I go.

JIM: Who I was, I am no more. Who I'll be? Don't know.

DORIS: It's a crazy feeling. My soul is healing With joy that won't go away.

FLO, JIM, DORIS: Change is here, And happening is happening to me. (Flo spies JOHN passing through, looks at him, and follows him. JIM and DORIS stop. JOHN tends the bar.)

JIM: You know, Doris, I've done a lot of things in my day but I've never been on a riverboat cruise before. This is gonna be great! All-inclusive. Food. Drinks. (*suggestively*) Everything.

DORIS: If you say so, Jim.

DORIS: Yes, and thanks for bringing Flo along. You didn't have to do that, but-

JIM: Aw, I know. You feel more comfortable with your ol' pal along for the ride. Flo's a good time. And anyway, (*suggestively again*) she's got her own room!

DORIS: You think she's cruising?

JIM: We're all cruising! Cruising down the river! She's your friend, what do you think?

DORIS: I think I'd better go check on her. (DORIS finds FLO.)

FLO: Doris! Why aren't you getting settled with Rudy?

DORIS: You know I'm uncomfortable about all of this. At our age? Sneaking off together. We're not even married —

FLO: Stop worrying, will ya? So you have some laughs.

DORIS: (nodding toward JOHN) You were flirting with him, weren't you?

FLO: Who me? Nah. I'm just waiting to get this show on the road.

DORIS: You mean the river.

FLO: Whatever. Road, river. It's all-inclusive. That's all that matters to me!

JIM, DORIS, FLO, JOHN, RUDY, PAT: The river of life is flowing through me. The tide is high and I'm becoming whole. The river of life has washed away the pain.
