

CAST

GLORIA: She was the newest member the year before last.

NOTE: Non-speaking extras may be double cast as club members.

<u>Place:</u> The parish hall decorated for a party.

<u>Time:</u>

The annual Perfect Petunias Luncheon.

At Rise: There are several tables with floral decorations. Three women sit at each table. At one table sits MARY ALICE, ROSE and FLORENCE. GLORIA is gathering her purse and coat to leave. DIXIEANNA, MARIETTA, and LUCY BELLE are huddled at their table secretly going through bingo cards and a deck of cards. At another table sit a pile of gaily wrapped gifts. There is a small podium which DIXIEANNA approaches with the cards in hand.

DIXIEANNA: Ladies, ladies I want to again thank everyone for all the work you did to make this year's Perfect Petunias luncheon a huge success. The chicken a la king was lovely, Mary Alice, and the peppermint fudge was to die for, Florence, and I just don't know what to say about that Waldorf salad, Marietta.

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MARIETTA: I customized it this year. Instead of apples, I used marshmallows and green maraschino cherries. Instead of walnuts I used Spanish peanuts, and instead of mayonnaise I used cool whip, so I'm not calling it a Waldorf salad anymore, I'm calling it an Econolodge Salad in honor of our town's finest hotel.

GLORIA: (*GLORIA rolls her eyes and heads offstage*) Ladies, try to remember it's just a game!

DIXIEANNA: First, for the benefit of our new members, we have made some improvements to the traditional bingo game. Instead of using those little balls we have created a special deck of bingo cards. (*holds a card aloft*) Every number between 1 and 75 is represented on the cards which I will randomly draw and call. Don't worry, I will shuffle the deck between every game.

MARY ALICE: (*raising her hand*) I noticed that some members have two cards. I'd like a second card please.

DIXIEANNA: And we would love for you to have two cards too, but we don't have enough cards.

LUCY BELLE: In the fight several years ago, some punch was spilled on a number of cards and they were just ruined.

MARIETTA: So we decided at our January officers' meeting that elected officers should play two cards each.

DIXIEANNA: And now it has become another time honored tradition. If you are ever lucky enough to be elected to office, you too will be given two cards. It's a small perk for all the drudgery of running this club.

MARY ALICE: You play two cards, too? You're the caller.

DIXIEANNA: Lucy Belle and Marietta are kind enough to play one of my cards each. Now, are we ready ladies?

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LUCY BELLE: Get on with it, Dixieanna, stop dilly dallying.

DIXIEANNA: (looks at the card in surprise) I-17.

MARIETTA: An 'I?' How did that get in there? And I only have it on one of my cards.

LUCY BELLE: I don't have it on ANY of mine.
