

Spying Charles' reading glasses on the empty chair, she tries those. They are stronger. She then moves from her chair to Charles' chair, still wearing Charles' reading glasses. Martha is pleased with herself. Charles enters and notices that things are not as they should be.)

CHARLES: What are you doing?

(Martha ignores him)

CHARLES: You're in my chair.

(Martha rattles the newspaper)

CHARLES: Yours is here...next to mine.

MARTHA: Not today.

CHARLES: I'm not kidding around, Martha. Get up.

CHARLES: And you're wearing my reading glasses...

MARTHA: They're stronger. My eyes are getting worse.

(Charles sits on the edge of Martha's chair and takes off his shoes and socks.)
